land County there are 2500 single-parent households and 1/3 of them live in poverty; the boys and girls in these homes need mentors to lean on and learn from to help them grow into responsible, confident adults. Susan reviewed the BBBS programs that prove that their mentoring method works: the one-to-one relationship; Families and Couples for Kids; High School Bigs; Teaming Up with YOUth; Middle School Mentoring called "Moving On"; and a new program called Community Construct. Each one of these programs pairs mentors with young people to help them build confidence, prepare them for the future, learn new things, and

so much more. Graduates of the BBBS programs are less likely to use drugs, more likely to get a degree, and earn higher incomes.

To showcase how the mentoring process encourages achievement and improves self-esteem, Susan introduced Big Sister Lindy Doran and her Little Sister, Ashley. Linda began by encouraging Zonta members to become bigs because of the great, positive influence we could have on young people. She explained that it's a once a week commitment where "just being there" is the most important factor. Linda said she and Ashley talk about every day things like shopping, homework, friends, and now....boys. At that point, she turned the podium over to Ashley.

Ashley told us what a difference Linda had made in her life. Through Linda's guidance, Ashley has learned to make better decisions, be more respectful of others, improve her school work, and take responsibility for her own actions. In closing, Ashley caused Linda to become a little misty when she summarized their relationship by telling us that Linda has helped her mature. "She is a great listener and she gives helpful advice. She's always there in times of need and she's a great friend."

Susan ended the presentation by reiterating Linda's plea for us to consider becoming mentors. "You don't have to change your life to change the life of a child."


YWPA Scholarship Applicants Sought

In addition, the joy and appreciation we see in the clients we serve during the event is a real testament to what this party and your volunteerism means to them.

I would like to share something that happened at the end of the party:

I was leading Santa Claus out of the house when one of our little residents, a boy aged four, called out, "WAIT, SANTA, WAIT." Santa turned to him and bent down. The little boy extended his arm out to Santa and gave him a cookie and said, "Santa, this is for you." And then the boy extended his other hand and placed a carrot in Santa's white glove and said "This is for Rudolph." Of course Santa replied with a hearty "HO, HO, HO", turned to leave as he waved goodbye stating "Santa loves you." The boy returned to his mother and was enveloped in her arms. (I am sure he was thinking that this is the coolest place on earth because Santa comes to "his" basement.) But what Santa didn't get to see was his mother smiling, with tears in her eyes. Thank you for taking time during this past holiday season to make a difference in the lives of those served by Shelterhouse because everyone deserves a life without fear.



They'll be used as a fundraising tool, especially at conferences and workshops.












Financial Results: 2006-2010

Net revenue over expense to club





• Ticket Sales: \$14,395 (2009 - \$12,500)


