President's Message from Cynthia Chilcote



Violence Against Women...Gender Violence...Domestic Violence. At this time of year, those of us who follow women's issues are feeling bombarded – overwhelmed by the media messages about violence against women – and pretty helpless. According to the National Organization for Women (NOW), we should be feeling a bit queasy. After two decades of international campaigns against gender violence, little progress has been made. Around the world, as many as one in every three women has been beaten, coerced into sex, or abused in some other way - most often by someone she knows, including by her husband or another male family member; one woman in four has been abused during pregnancy.

Violence against women continues to be called "the most pervasive, yet least recognized, human.rights abuse in the world." The UN Population Fund (UNFPA) says gender violence jeopardizes women's lives, bodies, psychological integrity and freedom. It both reflects and reinforces inequities between men and women. It serves, by intention or effect, to perpetuate male power and control, sustained by a culture of silence and denial. It has far-reaching consequences, harming families and communities, stunting human development, and undermining economic growth.

Worse yet – it happens everywhere – at home and at work, on the streets and in schools, during peacetime and in times of conflict. And in little ol' Midland, Michigan.

The messages will keep coming...the frightening images...the horrifying statistics. But, we can have an impact. It starts with personal responsibility. We can act first as individuals. Take the first step – become aware - learn about the issue. Learn the warning signs of abuse. Then pay attention. Pay attention to what people say, what people do. Discourage behaviors that devalue and demean women. Stop supporting products, companies, movies and music that objectify women and sexualize young girls. Offer personal support and understanding to women who are threatened by violence.

As Zontians, we have a chance to multiply our impact by actively supporting programs like the ZISVAW, 16 Days of Activism Against Gender Violence, Say NO-UNITE to End Violence Against Women, and our local Shelterhouse. We Zontians are part of a wonderful, dedicated community of women with a passion for changing lives and we can do it – one step at a time.

District 15 Fall Conference Review (by Carole Calvert-Baxter)



"The Sounds of Zonta" resonates as one of the best District Conferences yet! The Dearborn Inn was an enchanting venue surrounded by the colors of the season. Our 40th Zonta District 15 Conference hosted by the Zonta Club of Southfield Area far exceeded any of our expectations.

The *First Business Session* gave us an opportunity to meet the candidates running for District Board for the 2012-2014 biennium, receive a message from Dianne Cur-

tis, our Zonta International President, and meet our Zonta International Vice-President, Maria Jose Landeira Oestergaard, who reminded us that one of the most important sounds of Zonta is "our voice". Fun followed as we moved to "Motown Sounds" in the Alexandria Ballroom to the timeless tunes of earlier days.

The **Second Business Session** gave us a glimpse into the **State of the District**. There are currently 40 Zonta clubs within District 15, totaling 916 members.

Jacquie Gudmundsen, Past Governor and International Director shared the District's Goal of \$100,000 in donations to the Zonta International Foundation, with 100% participation from District Clubs. Jacquie reminded us that today, worldwide, 70% of the 1.3 billion poor are women, gender barriers to education remain, 15 million women are living with HIV and violence, and human trafficking must stop. It is only through our efforts and our dollars, collectively and independently, that we will be able to effect change.

Our own president, *Cynthia Chilcote*, Public Relations Committee Member, unveiled the Public Relations Guide for the District.

Jan Mincinelli, Gayle Manley and Sharon Mortensen (at right) discussed the prevalence of violence against women and why social change is necessary if we hope to stop violence. They also shared suggestions for advocacy efforts that Zonta Clubs may consider.

The **Status of Women** luncheon's "Rock around the World" keynote speaker, Bridgette Carr, Founder of the Human Trafficking Law Clinic University of Michigan, was informative and thought-provoking. The Human Trafficking Clinic (HTC) is the first clinical law program that is solely dedicated to the issue of human trafficking.

The members of the Zonta Club of Midland were proud to see Katelyn Flint be recognized as this year's Zonta International Young Women in Public Affairs award winner. Charlotte Allen was recognized at the Service of Remembrance. Her yellow rose was carried by Esther Seaver.

grams developed to help reduce them. There is a domestic violence incident every 13 seconds, and every two minutes someone in the US is sexually assaulted. One of the main culprits driving the statistics is media portrayal of women and girls.

A very graphic, demeaning-to-women, violence-laden Eminem video was shown to emphasize how violence against women is imbedded in our culture. Advertisements that sexualize young girls are an accepted practice that needs to be addressed. What can you do to help? Challenge it, reject it, don't buy it. Teach men and boys that real strength comes from respecting women. Then, take action by offering support, speaking up, and reporting any incident or emergency.

After dinner, Kate Maxwell, Fellowship Committee Chair, reminded everyone that October is also Breast Cancer Awareness Month. Handouts regarding breast self-exams were available for everyone to take home. Carole Calvert-Baxter encouraged every women over 40 to get a mammogram every year.

Kate also thanked members who have contributed food to the Fellowship Committee's campaign to give back to the community. The October donations were given directly to United Way.

As the meeting closed, Cynthia thanked our guests and encouraged them to consider joining Zonta.

Campaign Against Gender Violence Gears Up (by Cynthia Chilcote)



The international campaign, 16 Days of Activism Against Gender Violence, celebrates its 20th year in 2011. The campaign runs from November 25, International Day Against Violence Against Women, through December 10, International Human Rights Day, each year.

Over 3,700 organizations in 164 countries, including Zonta International, support and have participated in the "16 Days" Campaign since its inception in 1991.

The campaign's dates symbolically link violence against women and human rights, emphasizing that such violence is, in fact, a violation of human rights. The 16-day period also highlights these significant dates: November 29, Inter-

national Women Human Rights Defenders Day; December 1, World AIDS Day; and December 6, which marks the Anniversary of the Montreal Massacre.

Originating at the first Women's Global Leadership Institute sponsored by the Center for Women's Global Leadership in 1991, the 16 Days Campaign has been used as an organizing strategy by individuals and groups around the world to call for the elimination of all forms of violence against women.

The 16 Days of Activism Against Gender Violence campaign:

- raises awareness about gender-based violence as a human rights issue at the local, national, regional and international levels
- strengthens local work around violence against women
- establishes a clear link between local and international work to end violence against women
- provides a forum in which organizers can develop and share new and effective strategies
- demonstrates the solidarity of women around the world organizing against violence against women
- creates tools to pressure governments to implement promises made to eliminate violence against women.


