Michele Atwell, Service Committee Chair, explained that the scholarships are awarded to women re-entering the workforce and first-timers who need a little help due to unforeseen circumstances. Each winner was introduced by a Zonta member who teased the audience with a snippet about the winner. Each winner then took the microphone to share her story:

Laurie Doerner moved to Midland under stressful circumstances. Her son, who had problems in school and was thought to have ADHD, was later diagnosed with Aspergers, a form of autism. When Laurie considered returning to school, she asked herself, "Do I even know how to study?" Her counselor told her she was just the right age, enriched by all her life experiences. She currently attends Delta, but has plans to earn a master's degree in counseling and obtain an LPC license. Laurie is inspired by her 94-1/2 year-old grandmother who voluntarily gave up driving to "accept where I'm at." Laurie thanked the Zonta Club for encouraging her with this scholarship.

Noel Contardi, working toward a physical therapy assistant degree at Delta, gave up a job she loved to follow her husband to a new job and stay at home to raise her family. She lived in Ludington for 7 years before moving to Midland. She said the move felt wrong from the beginning. After several months, her marriage ended and she became a single (continued on Page 2)

mother with 3 children to support. After being out of the workforce for 15 years, Noel needed help to get back on her feet. She thanked the Zonta Club for the financial assistance to go back to school. "I couldn't do it without you guys!"

A single Mom of a 6-year-old son, Megan Griswold is at SVSU completing coursework for a social work degree to help special-needs children. She spent the last 5 years working with adults and children with special needs. She said that most people go first to what people with special needs *can't* do; she focuses on what they *can* do. Megan worked as a teacher for 5 years and realized it wasn't for her. She expressed her appreciation to her parents and mentors and said she's "proud to be associated with the generous women" of Zonta.

Chantel Heilman is a previous winner of a Zonta scholarship and has appeared in the newspaper promoting the Zonta Homewalk. She has a BS in business from Northwood, but now attends CMU where she continues coursework toward a degree in Applied Behavior Analysis and Speech Pathology. Introduced to the world of autism 4 years ago, Chantel loves working with children in schools. She told a story about an autistic first-grader who took her untended keyboard and began typing one day. His first word was "elephant." "What first-grader knows how to spell elephant?" she asked incredulously. He then proceeded to type out the names of everyone in his class. Within 3

weeks he was typing for everyone, not just Chantel. She said that she "would not have been able to attend school without this scholarship."

After the scholarship winners concluded their heartfelt stories, Diane Moomey reminded everyone that Homewalk revenue also supports Zonta International programs and local service grants. She then had the homeowners and their decorators stand to be recognized. Homeowners "give" their homes to Zonta for a weekend and let hundreds of people through their doors. The decorators bring their significant talents to create magnificent displays throughout the homes.

Orientation Party Introduces New Members to Zonta

Sandy Weimer hosted an orientation party at her home to introduce new members to the many opportunities for active participation in our Zonta Club. After a little light dinner and a lot of socializing, the formal presentation began.

Susan Putnam distributed a "Welcome to Zonta" handout that explained the hierarchy of Zonta from the international to local level. She reviewed the programs and initiatives that Zonta International supports and funds. With 1200 clubs in 63 countries (more in Europe than in any other part of the world), Zonta partners with the United Nations to impact women worldwide. Diane Moomey recommended that new members use their member number to login to the International website and watch the videos depicting Zonta activities. (The club treasurer has all the member numbers and it also appears on the address label of the Zonta International magazine.)

She then reviewed our local club's meeting schedule and attendance policy. The next section of the handout listed all the committees in our club. Susan asked a member from the committee under discussion to describe what their committee does and the activities they support.

The ARR (Assimilation, Retention, and Rejuvenation) Committee was described by Kate Maxwell who explained that this committee hosts ZINGs (Zonta Informal Network Gatherings) throughout the year. Events include Loons' games in the Northwood suite, wine-tastings, jewelry-making, and movie nights. Kate also highlighted the Fellowship Committee, which creates ice-breakers at dinner meetings and hosts the June Social. She added that the ARR, Fellowship, and Membership Committees work in tandem to make new members feel welcome, keep all members engaged, and recruit new members.

The Bylaws Committee is responsible for ensuring that our local bylaws mirror international bylaws. The biennial ZI meeting may make changes to the bylaws, which are then brought back to the local clubs so their bylaws can be updated.

Esther Williams shared the Archives Committee's need for articles and clippings about our members and ZCoM's participation in community events. The Archives Committee is responsible for maintaining the history of the club.

Golden Z Committee is the latest addition to our committee list. Rhonda Anderson explained that Golden Z is actually the university-level club sponsored by the local Zonta Club to introduce young women to Zonta and develop their interest in membership. Northwood University is the site of our Golden Z and will come to full participation this coming fall when the students return to class. Northwood is a good fit for a Golden Z club as 300 of the 1600 students are from other countries. (continued on next page)

Elizabeth Lumbert led the Homewalk Committee discussion. She told new members that each Zonta member must sell at least 6 Homewalk tickets and they must participate as a hostess at least one day of Homewalk weekend. When you arrive at the home you're working, you receive a tour and are usually given specific information about the house to share with visitors. This year, Linda Malekadeli will host an "Afterglow" party the Tuesday after Homewalk.

Lisa Orlando from the Intercity/United Nations Committee explained that this committee promotes the Intercity Dinner. The cities involved in the last dinner were Saginaw, Midland, and Mt. Pleasant. The committee is also spearheading the effort to create "birthing kits" for distribution to women in countries with high infant/mother mortality rates due to unclean surroundings.

Colette St. Louis reviewed the main focal points for the PR Committee: the newsletter, the website, Facebook activity, press releases, and the Yellow Book. This committee is responsible for getting the word out about ZCoM and keeping members informed about club activities. The Yellow Book is our membership listing and contains all the pertinent information a member may need about club policy, bylaws, committees, and leadership. Colette explained that the Homewalk Committee has its own PR subcommittee that handles Homewalk publicity.

The Service Committee, chaired this year by Michele Atwell, reviews, recommends, and distributes Zonta funds to support local needs using a grant form process. Michele explained that the focus this year was on health and hygiene for women in need and they worked with Shelterhouse to address these needs. This committee also reviews the scholarship applications received by the Midland Area Community Foundation and determines the winners of our Homewalk scholarships.

The Ways and Means Committee has the April Auction as its main event. Colette reported that we raised \$6500 at this year's auction. The funds raised support internal operations and leadership development. In addition, this committee runs the 50/50 drawings at most lunch and business meetings and collects the money from dollar announcements. The committee also sells yellow rose note cards and Zonta clings at district meetings, Spring workshops, and Fall conference.

Susan brought the presentation to a close by explaining the networking policy and the "Opt Out" option. We want to encourage members to connect with each other outside Zonta, so if you want to be contacted by members to participate in non-Zonta events, you opt out of the Zonta International policy of not using the membership list for personal gain.


