It's an amazingly beautiful place to work full of challenges and opportunities that change with the seasons.

Many of you will already know that I was widowed young. I look back to that year and still feel a bit in awe of it. I had graduated from MSU and married my high school sweetheart Kevin Chaussee. As far as I was concerned life was right on plan. Just shy of eight years of marriage Kevin was diagnosed with stage four colon cancer. After an intense eleven month battle where we never gave up hope; we lost horribly. The world lost an amazing guy and I love to share stories about him. I have never felt more passionate about anything as when I was fighting to save him. I discovered that you can tap into an undefinable amount of courage when you love someone.

Who I am now is intertwined with rising to the challenge of being a young widow.

When Kevin died, it was a time of extreme grief and deep reflection. I consciously and determinedly chose to "go on and be happy" rather than to just "go on." I continued to work at Dow Gardens and went back to school and earned my MBA from Northwood University. Today, I'm married to a great guy, Keith Lumbert. He helped me finish the home that Kevin and I were building. Together we took the boards from trees that Kevin had felled and turned them into flooring and trim. Keith gave me space to grieve and became my best friend. While I never had children of my own, I'm now a full-fledged Grandma to four wonderful little girls thanks to Keith's two amazing daughters. I





have a cookie baking drawer in my kitchen and an apron collection at the ready.

I love spending time at home. Every spring we plant a large garden. Every fall I'm busy canning tomatoes and green beans. I like to sit on the screened porch in the evening and listen to the tree frogs. I'm content to grab a book and watch the windmill turn. If you visit I'll most likely take you down the trail through the woods to show you our tree farm where we are just beginning to grow more than 200 walnut trees. When I travel, my first choice is to head out west and explore the National Parks. In the winter I love

to ice fish with Keith and eat grilled cheese in our shanty. Close to my heart is volunteering as a counselor for teens at Camp Warm Hearts (a grief camp for kids offered by Mid-Michigan Home Care).

### **Upcoming Social Meeting Speakers**

#### October 16 Social Meeting—SUBJECT: Human Trafficking



#### Jane P. White

Ms. White serves as the Director of the Michigan Human Trafficking Task Force and was formerly the Associate Director of the National Center for Community Policing at Michigan State University where she worked with criminal justice agencies nationally and internationally on organizational change and leadership. The Task Force represents some ninety different agencies at the federal, state, and local enforcement level, NGO's, victim service providers, community members, faith-based groups, University of Michigan Trafficking Law Clinic, health care groups, and multiple other interests. Jane started her career as a police officer and then became the Director of the Criminal Justice and Law Center at Lansing Community College and Mid-Michigan Police Academy, where she developed and implemented the largest law enforcement training center in the State. She has served on Foundation Boards, Boys and Girls Club Board of Directors,

United Way Board and several criminal justice alliances. She was also appointed by the Governor to the first Correctional Officers' Training Commission and worked extensively with both Police Foundation in Washington DC, and Michigan Commission on Law Enforcement Standards as well as a private consultant.



For the past 4 years, she has worked extensively on Human Trafficking in the United States directing the campaign of anti-slavery work in the state by building a Task Force of over 90 agencies. The goals of the Task Force are to increase collaboration, to build public awareness, to develop information sharing networks, to prosecute offenders, and to establish a protocol of investigation and recovery of victims.

#### Marcella Hadden

Ms. Hadden is a member of the Saginaw Chippewa Tribe and is its Public Relations Manager. She has worked for the Tribe for 17 years, both in gaming and government entities. She graduated with an Associates Degree in Business from Northern Michigan University. After graduation she worked for a Marquette law firm for 4 years. In the mid-70s she and her family settled on the Isabella reservation where she has many friends and relatives in the Tribal community.

According to her bio on the Tribe's website, Ms. Hadden considers maintaining "a positive image of the Tribe, its membership, and its government" as a

main focus for her department. She believes in being proactive rather than reactive to address areas of concern. Keeping the lines of communication open among Council Administrators, membership, and media outlets using established protocols on media communication fosters a positive image while protecting the Tribe.

Women are extremely influential in the Tribe's leadership and management. Ms. Hadden will be discussing the role of women in today's Native American culture, the changes that have taken place, and the issues facing modern tribal women.

#### **State Representative Joan Bauer**

State Representative Joan Bauer is currently serving in her third term as State Representative for the 68th House District. Prior to being elected to the State House, she served on the Lansing City Council for eleven years. Representative Bauer has been a champion for women's issues in the Legislature; she has introduced Pay Equity legislation every term, serves as Co-Chair of the Bi-Partisan, Bi-Cameral Women's caucus, and is a founding member of the House Democratic Women's Caucus. Representative Bauer is a proud former member of the Zonta Club of Lansing.



#### National playwright and director, Dorthea Sharon

National playwright and director, Dorthea Sharon, teamed up with Vanguard Community Development Corporation to create a documentary focusing on domestic violence. Through a partnership with Zonta Detroit I, young women from Vanguard, took part in the production of "Love is Not a Black Eye," a film centered on the teen violence in domestic relationships.

Ms. Sharon believes the documentary is a power packed tool to combat domestic violence. The documentary displays the warning signs of dangerous relationships, provides support that victims of this abuse are not alone, and tackles how to fight this form of abuse. Zonta Detroit I, is part of an international fellowship of members who are committed to preserving and nourishing women's rights. Their involvement in the documentary brought valuable experience to the film, and especially to the teen girls who helped produce the film.

It is the sincere hope and prayer of Ms. Sharon that everyone that watches this documentary will be moved to help someone get out of a vicious cycle.



## Jan Mancinelli is President of the Zonta Club of Petoskey and Executive Director of the Women's Resource Center of Northern Michigan Inc. in Petoskey.

Jan has over 30 years with the Women's Resource Center in Petoskey and in that time she has touched the lives of countless women and their children in Northern Michigan. She has dedicated her career to ending violence against women in Michigan and currently serves as the local women's center's executive director.

Jan will discuss a documentary on how women are "misrepresented" in the media. The documentary ties in all of the misrepresentation to attitudes and how women are socialized and how men are taught to view them. It also ties into all of the violence against women, how eating disorders are rampant and growing with young girls etc...It was showcased last fall in the debut of the Oprah network and released to the public shortly after.






