

2015 Homewalk A Big Hit

The 2015 Zonta Holiday Homewalk represented another successful event for the Midland Chapter. Beautiful weather combined with exquisite holiday decor, resulted in strong attendance over the 2-day event. The average daily attendance was just short of 400 visitors, nearly 100/hour. Visitors marveled at the beauty of the homes and willingly shared their favorites with our volunteer hostesses. As always, the diversity in design and architecture of the

homes created widespread interest.

Our Rest Stop this year was hosted by Midland's Independence Village. Homewalk ticket holders enjoyed excellent food while listening to live holiday music. We experienced a record number of visitors at the Rest Stop, averaging 230/day!

Sponsorship contributions for this year's event totaled \$14,875. Ticket sales totaled \$13,975, representing \$7,995-membership sales, \$4,920ticket locations and \$1,060-tickets sold at the door the day of the event.

HIV-Free Nation



CREATING AN HIV-FREE NATION IN RWANDA

In cooperation with the US Fund for UNICEF, Zonta International has supported efforts to eliminate mother-to-child transmission of HIV and gender-

based violence in Rwanda since 2008. In that time, Zonta has provided more than US\$2 million to this project, with US\$800,000 allocated in the 2014-2016 Biennium.



PROJECT OVERVIEW

Rwanda has set an ambitious target to achieve an HIV-free generation, and has maintained a low HIV prevalence at about 3 percent of the adult population. Still, throughout the country, adolescents, especially girls, remain at increased risk of contracting HIV. At the same time, providing protection for the country's 130,000 orphans is another critical factor in further reducing the prevalence of HIV and curbing issues of violence and abuse.

RESULTS

The project has impacted 95 percent of mother-infant pairs in 27 Prevention of Mother to Child Transmission (PMTCT) family package sites and approximately 7,000 adolescent boys and girls have been reached with HIV prevention information and services. To date, a total of 300 health facility managers have received training on data collection to facilitate more comprehensive results around children with HIV. This initial investment will have a catalytic effect as it will provide more robust statistics and provide greater insight into HIV transmission among adolescents and inform the national response strategy. 
Federal Government Continues Focus on Human Trafficking

January has once again been proclaimed National Slavery and Human Trafficking Prevention Month as America's top lawmaker urges the country to "recognize the vital role we can play in ending all forms of slavery and to observe this month with appropriate programs and activities."

Let's Learn About Human Trafficking – How Can it Exist Today?

Human trafficking is an incredibly complex issue based

on dozens of contributing factors. So to understand how trafficking exists today, what it looks like, and why it is sustained, let's explore three factors that give it fuel.



"One hundred and fifty years ago, our Nation codified the fundamental truth that slavery is an affront to human dignity. Still, the bitter fact remains that millions of men, women, and children around the globe, including here at home, are subject to modern-day slavery: the cruel, inhumane practice of human trafficking." - Barack Obama, U.S; President

Slavery of the past was an accepted economic practice used to systematically exploit a specific group of people. Today, human trafficking is a criminal activity, and anyone can be a human trafficking victim regardless of ethnicity, nationality, gender, or economic status.


Human trafficking is now facilitated online and through social media. Traffickers use love and affection as attraction and control mechanisms, and victims might not even self-identify as victims.

What Factors Fuel Human Trafficking?

- 1. High reward/low risk traffickers can expect to make a lot of money with minimal fear of punishment or legal consequence. It's the second most profitable illegal industry be sold over and over again.
- consumers for cheap goods incentivizes corporations to demand cheap labor, often

forcing those at the bottom of the supply chain to exploit workers. Increased demand for commercial sex incentivizes commercial sex venues to recruit and exploit children.

3. Systemic inequalities - Mass displacement, conflict, extreme poverty, lack of access to education and job opportunities, violence, and harmful social norms like child marriage are all factors that push individuals into



trafficking. Families living in extreme poverty or families in situations of desperation are more likely to accept risky job offers. And, when girls aren't allowed to learn, parents are more likely to sell their daughters to men for marriage. Ultimately, harmful social norms and systemic inequity fuel trafficking because traffickers target vulnerability.
